

director's notes

The 19C Danish philosopher, Soren Kierkegaard, said that, "Life can only be understood backwards; but it must be lived forwards." In 'Proof' we see a series of scenes, that jump forwards and backwards in time, in the lives of four characters - Catherine, her mathematician father Robert, who is a professor at the University of Chicago, her sister Claire and a one-time student of her father named Hal.

The existentialists who followed Kierkegaard, such as Sartre, Camus and Nietzsche, asserted that life has no meaning, other than the one we personally assign to it. The events in 'Proof are interpreted and given meaning through the understanding of the four characters in the play and we, the audience, are invited to consider each viewpoint. Whose assessment is the truest? Indeed, is there a real, objective truth for a disinterested observer to discover?

Mathematics, the framing subject for the play, is a human construct with abstruse formulations, not an absolute reality. For example, we may slice a cake into three equal portions and call each a third - we understand this as a fraction of the whole, a ratio or rational number. And yet if we express that value as a decimal - 0.33333... recurring, suddenly that same value, that was and still represents one third, which when tripled, paradoxically equals 0.9999... recurring, a number exceedingly close to, but not exactly 1.

Mathematical proofs are inferential arguments constructed from axioms, theorems and a priori assumptions accepted as true. So are our interpretations and understandings of life, our relationships, our loves, our duties and our loyalties. These are what are explored in 'Proof' through the lives of Catherine, Robert, Claire and Hal.

An equally significant theme of 'Proof is mental health, particularly with regard to Robert, Catherine's mathematical genius father. What qualities, good and bad, have Catherine, and Claire too, inherited from their father? What role

does mental instability
play as a partial source of
Robert's insights into
complex mathematical
concepts? A number of
geniuses from history
have had mental issues
to deal with: Beethoven,
Michelangelo, Dickens,
Darwin, Newton, Tolstoy and
many more.


Then there is the question of the provision of care for the mentally ill. 'Proof' asks us to consider the impact, burden and responsibilities laid on Catherine and Claire, in assessing and providing for the practicalities of Robert's needs as his mental state slowly deteriorates through periods of both confusion and remission.

'Proof' isn't condescending or didactic; it doesn't hand down false reassurances by providing answers to these questions. It merely presents them to us and gives us a touching, familiar and sympathetic portrayal of the beauty and frailty of


